SAILING INSTRUCTIONS

1. Rules	
1.1	The regatta will be governed by the rules as defined in <i>The Racing Rules of Sailing</i> .
1.2	The Exoneration Penalty, Advisory Hearing and RYA Arbitration of the RYA Rules Disputes Procedures (Chichester Harbour Federation Version) will be available at this event.
1.3	Racing rules 40, 41 and 61.1 will be changed as follows:
	RRS 40 is changed so that competitors shall wear an appropriately fitting Buoyancy Aid of at least PPE Classification 50 N at all times whilst afloat. Flag Y will not be displayed
	RRS 41 is changed so that When a competitor in a Rookie fleet race is seen by a Patrol Boat crew to be significantly astern of the bulk of the fleet, a Patrol Boat crew may offer advice to enable the competitor to overcome a manifest problem or improve their sailing performance at the time. However, when the boat may have gained an unfair advantage as a result of such help, the race or protest committee may protest her or a competitor may request redress. Any penalty is at the discretion of the protest committee
	RRS 61.1 is changed so that competitors wishing to protest shall also notify a safety or support vessel which shall relay this message to the Race Committee
1.4	If there is a conflict between languages the English text will take precedence.
2. Notices To Competitors	
Notices to competitors will be posted on	

Notices to competitors will be posted on the official notice board located next to the registration desk

3. Changes To Sailing Instructions

Any change to the sailing instructions will be posted before 0930 on the day it will take effect, except that any change to the schedule of races will be posted by 1800 on the day before it will take effect.

4. Signals Made Ashore

- 4.1 Signals made ashore will be displayed on the mast situated between the two slipways
- 4.2 When flag AP is displayed ashore, '1 minute' is replaced with 'not less than 20 minutes' in the race signal AP.
- 4.3 Launch Control: When, before a race, a fleet's class flag is displayed ashore no boat in that fleet shall launch until their class flag is removed. The boat may rig and approach the beach while their class flag is displayed ashore

5. Schedule Of Races

5.1 Dates of racing:

October 1st and 2nd

5.2 Number of races:

All fleets will sail six races; three on Saturday and three on Sunday

No more than four races will be sailed on any one day.

- 5.3 The scheduled time of the warning signal for the first race each day is 11:25 on Saturday, October 1st, 11:55 on Sunday, October 2nd
- 5.4 Subsequent races will be sailed as soon as is practicable after the completion of the preceding race
- 5.5 To alert boats that a race or sequence of races will begin soon, the orange starting line flag will be displayed with one sound at least five minutes before a warning signal is made.
- 5.6 On the last day of the regatta no warning signal will be made after 1530.

6. Class Flags

Class flags will be:

Flag
Block white flag
Block purple flag
Block yellow flag
Block green flag
Block pink flag

7. Rookie Fleet

7.1 The Pink or 'Rookie' fleet is open to any sailor who has not taken part in a significant open regatta away from home

8. Racing Areas

8.1 Racing will be divided between two courses - 'A' and 'B' - which will be advised at briefing.

9. The Courses

9.1 Courses will be an arrangement of moveable marks and outlined in the sailors' briefing on Saturday, October 1st

10. Marks

10.1 Marks of the course will be orange cylindrical marks. Any unique markings will be outlined at the sailors' briefing on Saturday, October 1st

11. The Start

- 11.1 (a) Races will be run sequentially. The start signal for the first fleet will be the warning signal for the second, and the start signal for the second fleet will be the warning signal for the third.

 (b) On Course 'A', the starting order will be White, Purple, Yellow. On Course 'B' the starting order will be Green, Pink. In the event of a postponement or general recall this order shall not change.
- 11.2 The starting line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the Committee Boat to starboard and the centre of a pin-end starting mark.
- 11.3 Boats whose warning signal has not been made shall remain outside an exclusion created by the Committee Boat, pin end and the final rounding mark of the course
- 11.4 A boat starting later than 4 minutes after her starting signal will be scored Did Not Start (DNS) without a hearing. This changes rule A4.
- 11.5 If flag U has been displayed as the preparatory signal, no part of a boat's hull, crew, or equipment shall be in the triangle formed by the ends of the starting line and the first mark during the last minute before her starting signal. If a boat breaks this rule and is identified, she shall be disqualified without a hearing but not if the race is restarted or resailed or postponed or abandoned before the starting signal. This changes rule 30

12. Change Of The Next Leg Of The Course

To change the next leg of the course, the race committee will move the original mark to a new position.

13. Lap Roundings and the Finish

- 13.1 The lap/finishing line will be between a staff displaying an orange flag on the Committee Boat to port and the centre of a finishing mark to starboard.
- 13.2 Racing will be run on an 'average lap' basis. Boats will sail an indefinite number of laps until ICF 'S' is displayed from the Committee Boat. When ICF 'S' is displayed, boats shall finish upon the conclusion of that lap.

14. Time Limits And Target Times

14.1 Time limits and target times are as follows:

Class; Time limit; Target time W/Y/Pu; 45 minutes; 35 minutes Green; 40 minutes; 30 minutes Rookie; [As defined at briefing] Failure to meet the target time will not be grounds for redress. This changes rule 62.1(a).

14.2 Boats failing to finish within 15 minutes after the first boat sails the course and finishes will be scored Did Not Finish without a hearing. This changes rules 35, A4 and A5.

15. Protests and Requests For Redress

- 15.1 Protest forms are available from the registration desk. Protests and requests for redress or reopening shall be delivered there within the appropriate time limit.
- For each class, the protest time limit is 90 minutes after the last boat has finished the last race of the day or the race committee signals no more racing today, whichever is later.
- 15.3 Notices will be posted no later than 30 minutes after the protest time limit to inform competitors of hearings in which they are parties or named as witnesses. Hearings will be held in the protest room, the location of which will be detailed on the official notice board.
- 15.4 Breaches of instructions 18 to 24, will not be grounds for a protest by a boat. This changes rule 60.1(a). Penalties for these breaches may be less than disqualification if the protest committee so decides.
- 15.5 On the last scheduled day of racing a request for redress based on a protest committee decision shall be delivered no later than 30 minutes after the decision was posted. This changes rule 62.2.

16. Scoring

16.1 The scoring system is as follows:

- 16.2 2 races are required to be completed to constitute a series.
- 16.3 (a) When fewer than 3 races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores.
 - (b) When from 3 to 5 races have been completed, a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst score.
 - (c) When 6 races have been completed a boat's series score will be the total of her race scores excluding her worst two scores

17. Safety Regulations

17.1 Check-Out and Check-In:

Boats shall be required to sign on and off the water through a tally system. Details of this system will be made available in the Team Manager's Briefing Document

17.2 A boat that retires from a race shall notify the race committee as soon as possible.

18. Replacement of Crew or Equipment

- 18.1 Substitution of competitors will not be allowed without prior written approval of the Organizing Authority.
- 18.2 Substitution of damaged or lost equipment will be permitted so long as the Race Committee is informed of any changes to sail numbers and this designation remains unique.

19. Support Boats

19.1 Team leaders, coaches and other support personnel shall stay outside areas where boats are racing from the time of the preparatory signal for the first class to start until all boats have finished or

retired or the race committee signals a postponement, general recall or abandonment.

20. Trash Disposal

Trash may be placed aboard support or official boats.

21. Radio Communication

Except in an emergency, a boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications not available to all boats. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones.

22. Prizes

Prizes will be given as follows:

The first, second and third boats with the lowest accumulated series score after discard in all fleets.

The boat with the lowest accumulated series score after discard in any class which consists of at least ten boats, excluding the Topper and Optimist Classes

23. Disclaimer of Liability

Competitors are reminded of RRS 4, Decision to Race. The organizing authority will not accept any liability for material damage or personal injury or death sustained in conjunction with or prior to, during, or after the regatta. The decision for a competitor to take part is the sole responsibility of their Team Manager.

24. Insurance

Each participating boat shall be insured with valid third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £2,000,000 per incident or the equivalent.
